1 Timothy 1

1 Timothy 1:1

ULT

¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the command of God our Savior and of the Lord Jesus Christ our hope,

UST

¹ {From} Paul, a man who represents Jesus the Messiah. This is what God, the one who saves us, and {our} Lord Jesus the Messiah, in whom we hope, commanded me to do.

How was Paul made an apostle of Christ Jesus?

Paul was made an apostle by to the commandment of God.

1 Timothy 1:2

ULT

² to Timothy, a true son in the faith: Grace, mercy, peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

UST

² You, Timothy, are {like} a true son to me as a fellow believer. May God the Father and our Lord Jesus the Messiah act kindly and mercifully to you, and keep you peaceful.

What was the relationship between Paul and Timothy?

Timothy was Paul's true son in the faith.

1 Timothy 1:3

ULT

³ As I urged you when I was going into Macedonia, remain in Ephesus so that you can command certain ones not to teach differently,

UST

³ {I urge you now,} just as I urged you when I was going to the province of Macedonia, to remain in the city of Ephesus. Stay there so that you can command certain men there to stop teaching people things that are different {from what is true}.

Where did Paul urge Timothy to remain?

He urged Timothy to remain in Ephesus.

What was Timothy to command certain people not to do?

He was to command them not to teach differently.

1 Timothy 1:4

ULT

⁴ and not to pay attention to myths and endless genealogies, which promote arguments rather than the stewardship of God, which {is} by faith.

UST

⁴ Instruct them to stop focusing on old useless stories and endless lists of ancestors. Those things {only} cause people to argue with each other. They do not help God's plan to move forward. That happens when we trust in God.

1 Timothy 1:5

ULT

⁵ Now the goal of this command is love from a pure heart, and a good conscience, and a sincere faith,

UST

⁵ We insist on these things so that {God's} people will love {each other}. They will do this when they desire only what is good, when they know confidently that they are doing the right things, and when they genuinely trust in God.

What did Paul say was the goal of his commandment and teaching?

The goal of his commandment was love from a pure heart, from a good conscience, and from sincere faith.

1 Timothy 1:6

ULT

⁶ from which some, having missed the mark, have turned away to foolish talk,

UST

⁶ Some people have rejected these good things. Instead, they prefer to teach useless things.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 1:7

ULT

⁷ wanting to be teachers of the law, not understanding either what they are saying or about which they make confident affirmations.

UST

⁷ They desire to be teachers of the laws {that God gave to Moses}, but they do not understand the things that they talk about, nor the things that they insist are true.

1 Timothy 1:8

ULT

⁸ But we know that the law (is) good, if one uses it lawfully,

UST

 $^{f 8}$ But we know that the laws {that God gave to Moses} are helpful if people use them in the right way.

1 Timothy 1:9

ULT

⁹ knowing this, that the law is not made for the righteous, but for the lawless and the rebellious, the ungodly and the sinful, the godless and the profane, father-killers and mother-killers, man-slayers,

UST

⁹ We know that God does not establish laws for people who do what is right, but for people who act as though there are no laws and who refuse to obey anyone. God establishes laws for those who do not honor God and for those who sin, for those who do not revere God and who pay no attention to him. He establishes laws for those who murder their fathers, for those who murder their mothers, and for those who murder other people.

For whom is the law made?

The law is for lawless, rebellious, ungodly people, and sinners.

1 Timothy 1:10

ULT

¹⁰ the immoral, male-liers, man-stealers, liars, perjurers, and if anything else is contrary to healthy teaching,

UST

¹⁰ {God establishes laws for} people who are sexually immoral, men who have sexual relations with other men, those who kidnap people {and sell them as slaves}, liars, those who are false witnesses {in courts of law}, and every other action that is contrary to {our} true teaching.

1 Timothy 1:11

ULT

¹¹ according to the gospel of glory of the blessed God, with which I have been entrusted.

UST

¹¹ {This teaching} comes from the good news about {our} wonderful God, whom we praise. This is the good news that he gave to me {to announce to others}.

1 Timothy 1:12

ULT

¹² I have gratitude to the one who strengthened me, Christ Jesus our Lord, because he considered me trustworthy, placing me into service,

UST

¹² I am grateful to Jesus our Lord the Messiah who enabled me {to do this work}, because he considered that he could trust me. So he appointed me to serve {him}.

1 Timothy 1:13

ULT

¹³ formerly being a blasphemer and a persecutor and an aggresor, but I was shown mercy because not knowing, I acted in unfaithfulness.

UST

¹³ Formerly I said false things about him, I caused his people to suffer, and I acted very violently {toward them}. But the Messiah acted kindly to me since I did not know that what I was doing was wrong. I did not know that what I was doing was wrong because I did not believe in him.

What sins did Paul formerly commit?

Paul was a blasphemer, persecutor, and a violent man.

1 Timothy 1:14

ULT

¹⁴ Indeed, the grace of our Lord overflowed with the faith and love that {are} in Christ Jesus.

UST

¹⁴ Our Lord abundantly did {for me} what I did not deserve, allowing me to believe in the Messiah Jesus and to love him as someone who belongs to him.

What overflowed to Paul, resulting in Paul becoming an apostle of Jesus Christ?

The grace of our Lord overflowed to Paul.

1 Timothy 1:15

ULT

¹⁵ This word {is} trustworthy and worthy of all acceptance, "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners"—of whom I am the first.

UST

¹⁵ Everyone should trust this statement and accept it completely: "Jesus the Messiah came into the world to save sinful people {so that God would not punish them for their sins}." {As for me,} I have sinned worse than all the others.

Who did Christ Jesus come into the world to save?

Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners.

1 Timothy 1:16

ULT

¹⁶ But for this reason I was shown mercy, so that in me, the first, Jesus Christ might demonstrate all patience as an example for those who would trust in him for eternal life.

UST

¹⁶ But this is why the Messiah Jesus acted mercifully to me. Since I am the person who has sinned worse than all others, he used me as an example to show how perfectly patient he is with people. He wanted to show this to the people who would later believe in him and, as a result, would live forever.

Why does Paul say God gave him mercy?

God gave Paul mercy so that Jesus could demonstrate his patience in Paul as an example.

1 Timothy 1:17

ULT

¹⁷ Now to the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, {be} honor and glory to eternity forever. Amen.

UST

¹⁷ So let us honor and praise the one who is the eternal king, the one whom no one can see and who can never die! He alone is God. Let us praise him forever and ever! May it be so!

1 Timothy 1:18

ULT

¹⁸ This command I am placing before you, {my} child, Timothy, in accordance with the earlier prophecies about you, that by them you might fight the good fight,

UST

¹⁸ Timothy, you are like a son to me. I am telling you to do these things in agreement with what people previously prophesied about you. I want those messages to encourage you to serve God as diligently as a soldier would obey a commanding officer.

What did Paul tell Timothy to do in accordance with the prophecies made about Timothy? Paul tells Timothy to fight the good fight.

1 Timothy 1:19

ULT

¹⁹ holding faith and a good conscience, which some, having rejected, have shipwrecked regarding the faith,

UST

¹⁹ Continue to trust {in the Lord Jesus} and to do only what you know to be right! Some people have stopped doing this and so have destroyed their relationship with God.

What happened to some who rejected their faith and their good conscience?

These people have shipwrecked their faith.

1 Timothy 1:20

ULT

²⁰ of whom are Hymenaeus and Alexander, whom I have given over to Satan so that they may be taught not to blaspheme.

UST

²⁰ Among the ones who have done this are Hymenaeus and Alexander. I put them into the control of Satan so that {when Satan makes them suffer} they may learn not to insult God.

What did Paul do for those men who had rejected faith and a good conscience and had shipwrecked their faith?

Paul gave them over to Satan so that they may be taught not to blaspheme.

1 Timothy 2

1 Timothy 2:1

ULT

¹ I urge, therefore, first of all, for requests, prayers, intercessions, thanksgivings to be made for all men,

UST

¹ Because of those things, the most important thing that I encourage {believers to do} is to {continually} pray to God on behalf of everyone. They should ask God for what they need, and also for what other people need, and they should thank God {for everything that he does}.

For whom does Paul request that prayers be made?

Paul requests prayers be made for all people.

1 Timothy 2:2

ULT

² for kings and all those who are in authority, so that we may live a peaceful and quiet life in all godliness and dignity.

UST

² {They should pray} for kings and for everyone who governs {over others} so that we can live peacefully and quietly. {That way we can do} all that God and others consider to be right and proper.

What kind of life does Paul desire Christians be allowed to live?

Paul desires that Christians be allowed to live a peaceful and quiet life in all godliness and dignity.

1 Timothy 2:3

ULT

³ This {is} good and acceptable before God our Savior,

UST

³ It is good {to pray like that}, and it pleases God, who saves us.

1 Timothy 2:4

ULT

⁴ who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

UST

⁴ God desires to save all people. He wants everyone to fully know and accept his true message.

What does God desire for all people?

God desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

1 Timothy 2:5

ULT

⁵ For {there is} one God, and one mediator of God and of men—the man Christ Jesus,

UST

⁵ That is because there is only one God {of everyone}, and there is only one person who can bring God and human beings together. That person is the Messiah Jesus, who is human himself.

What is Christ Jesus' position between God and man?

Christ Jesus is the one mediator between God and man.

1 Timothy 2:6

ULT

⁶ the one who gave himself {as} a ransom for all, the testimony in its own times,

UST

⁶ He willingly died {as a sacrifice} in order to rescue all people {from sin and death}. {He died} at the perfect time, and his death showed {that God desires to save all people}.

What did Christ Jesus do for all?

Christ Jesus gave himself as a ransom for all.

1 Timothy 2:7

ULT

⁷ for which I was made a herald and an apostle—I am speaking the truth in Christ, I am not lying—a teacher of the nations in faith and truth.

UST

⁷ It is to declare this message that God has appointed me to speak for him and has sent me to represent him. As surely as I belong to the Messiah, I am telling the truth. I am not lying! {God sent me} to teach those who are not Jews that they should believe God's true message.

Who does the apostle Paul teach?

Paul is a teacher of the nations.

1 Timothy 2:8

ULT

⁸ Therefore, I want the men in every place to pray, lifting up holy hands without anger and argument,

UST

⁸ Therefore, I want men in every place {where believers worship} to pray {to God}. They should live in a way that pleases God, lifting their hands to pray rather than because they are angry or quarreling {with someone}.

What does Paul want men to do?

Paul wants men to pray and lift up holy hands.

1 Timothy 2:9

ULT

⁹ likewise women to adorn themselves in proper attire, with modesty and self-control, not in braids and gold, or pearls, or expensive clothing,

UST

⁹ Similarly, {when gathering to worship God,} the women should wear appropriate clothing that is modest and sensible. They should not try to beautify themselves with elaborate hairstyles, or gold jewelry, or pearls, or expensive clothing.

What does Paul want women to do?

Paul wants women to dress modestly and with self-control.

1 Timothy 2:10

ULT

¹⁰ but what befits women professing godliness, through good works.

UST

¹⁰ Instead, {they should beautify themselves by doing} the things that women who claim to worship God should do. That is, {they should be doing} good things {for other people}.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 2:11

ULT

¹¹ Let a woman learn in quietness, in all submission.

UST

¹¹ Women should learn quietly {from the leaders of the congregation}, remaining subordinate to them at all times.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 2:12

ULT

¹² But I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man, but to be in quietness.

UST

¹² But I do not allow women to teach men, nor to have authority over men. Instead, women should remain quiet.

What does Paul not permit a woman to do?

Paul does not permit a woman to teach or to exercise authority over a man.

1 Timothy 2:13

ULT

¹³ For Adam was formed first, then Eve,

UST

¹³ After all, God made Adam first, and afterwards he made Eve,

What is the first reason that Paul gives for not permitting a woman to teach or exercise authority over a man?

Paul's first reason is that Adam was formed first.

1 Timothy 2:14

ULT

¹⁴ and Adam was not deceived, but the woman, having been deceived, came into transgression.

UST

¹⁴ and the snake did not deceive Adam. The snake deceived the woman {so that she did what God had told her not to do,} and she become a sinner.

What is the second reason that Paul gives for not permitting a woman to teach or exercise authority over a man?

Paul's second reason is that Adam was not deceived.

1 Timothy 2:15

ULT

¹⁵ But she will be saved through childbearing, if they remain in faith and love and holiness with self-control.

UST

¹⁵ But {even though she did that,} God will save women, although {they must still endure the pain of} bearing children, if they continue to trust in God, and to love others, and to live in a way that pleases God, and to behave sensibly.

In what does Paul want women to remain?

Paul wants women to continue in faith and love and sanctification with soundness of mind.

1 Timothy 3

1 Timothy 3:1

ULT

¹ This word {is} trustworthy: "If someone aspires to be an overseer, he desires a noble work."

UST

¹ Everyone should trust this statement: "If anyone aspires to be a leader of the believers, he desires to do a good task."

What kind of work is the work of an overseer?

The work of an overseer is good work.

1 Timothy 3:2

ULT

² Therefore, the overseer must be irreproachable, a husband of one wife, sober, self-controlled, orderly, hospitable, able to teach,

UST

² For that reason, a leader of the believers must be someone whom no one can rightly accuse of doing anything bad. He must be faithful to his wife. He must not do anything excessively. He must think in wise ways. He must behave well. He must welcome guests into his home. He must be able to teach others.

What must an overseer be able to do?

An overseer must be able to teach.

1 Timothy 3:3

ULT

³ not a drunkard, not a brawler, but gentle, peaceful, not money-loving,

UST

³ He must not be a drunkard and must not be quick to fight. Instead, he must be gentle and must not be quarrelsome. He must not love money.

How must an overseer handle alcohol and money?

An overseer must not be a drunkard, and must not love money.

1 Timothy 3:4

ULT

⁴ managing {his} own household well, having children in obedience with all honor

UST

⁴ He must lead and care for his own family well. His children should obey and completely respect him.

How should an overseer's children treat him?

An overseer's children must obey and honor him.

1 Timothy 3:5

ULT

⁵ (for if someone does not know how to manage {his} own household, how will he take care of the church of God?),

UST

⁵ After all, if anyone does not know how he should lead and care for the people who live in his own house, he certainly cannot care for the gathering of God's people!

Why is it important that an overseer manage his household well?

It is important because if he cannot manage his household well, he will likely not care well for a church.

1 Timothy 3:6

ULT

⁶ not a new convert, so that he may not fall, being puffed up, into the judgment of the devil.

UST

⁶ Do not appoint a new believer {to be a leader of the believers}, because he might become proud. Then God would judge him for the same reason as he judged the devil.

What is the danger if the overseer is a new convert?

The danger is that he will be puffed up and fall into condemnation.

1 Timothy 3:7

ULT

⁷ But he must also have a good reputation with those outside, so that he may not fall into disgrace and the trap of the devil.

UST

⁷ A leader of the believers must also conduct himself in such a way that nonbelievers will speak well of him. Then people will not say bad things about him, and the devil will not capture him like an animal in a trap.

What must an overseer's reputation be with those outside the church?

An overseer must have a good reputation with those outside the church.

1 Timothy 3:8

ULT

⁸ Likewise deacons {must be} dignified, not double-talkers, not indulging in much wine, not greedy,

UST

⁸ In the same way, those who {are appointed to} assist the leaders should be people who are serious and mature. They should be sincere when they speak. They should not drink too much wine, and they must not have a strong desire for money.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 3:9

ULT

⁹ holding the mystery of the faith with a clean conscience.

UST

⁹ They must always believe the message that God has now revealed to us about believing in him, while knowing within themselves that God approves of what they are doing.

1 Timothy 3:10

ULT

¹⁰ And let them also be tested first; then let them serve, being blameless.

UST

¹⁰ But {just as you do for the leaders,} you must first examine the way these assistants behave. Then, if you do not find any fault with them, you may let them serve {as assistants}.

What should be done with deacons before they serve?

Before they serve, deacons should be tested.

1 Timothy 3:11

ULT

¹¹ Likewise the women {must be} dignified, not slanderers, sober, trustworthy in everything.

UST

¹¹ Their wives likewise must be serious and mature, they must not talk badly about people, and they must do everything in moderation. They must be trustworthy in everything that they do.

What are some characteristics of godly women?

Godly women are dignified, not slanderers, sober, and trustworthy in everything.

1 Timothy 3:12

ULT

¹² Deacons are to be husbands of one wife, managing {their} own children and households well.

UST

¹² An assistant must be faithful to his wife, and he must lead and care well for his children and the rest of the people in his house.

1 Timothy 3:13

ULT

¹³ For those having served well acquire for themselves a good standing and much confidence in the faith that {is} in Christ Jesus.

UST

¹³ Assistants who serve well will increasingly benefit {from serving in this way} because people will respect them, and they will learn to speak very boldly about what they believe concerning the Messiah Jesus.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 3:14

ULT

¹⁴ I am writing these things to you, hoping to come to you in quickness,

UST

¹⁴ I hope that I will be able to come to you soon. But I am writing these things to you now

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 3:15

ULT

¹⁵ but if I delay, so that you may know how one ought to behave in the household of God, which is the church of the living God, a pillar and support of the truth.

UST

¹⁵ in case I am not able to come soon. I want you to know how believers should behave in the family of God, which is the group of all those who believe in Jesus and belong to the living God. The people in this group believe and teach the true message.

What is the household of God?

The household of God is the church of the living God.

1 Timothy 3:16

ULT

¹⁶ Indeed, admittedly great is the mystery of godliness: "Who was revealed in flesh, was justified in the Spirit, was seen by angels, was proclaimed among the nations, was believed in the world, was taken up in glory."

UST

¹⁶ And everyone must agree that this true message that God has revealed to us is marvelous: "The Messiah was God who came to the world in a human body. The Holy Spirit proved that he was genuine. God's messengers saw him. Believers announced who he was to the nations. People in many parts of the world believed in him. God powerfully took him up {to himself in heaven}."

After Jesus appeared in the flesh, was justified by the Spirit, and was seen by angels, what did he do?

Jesus was proclaimed among nations, believed in the world, and taken up in glory.

1 Timothy 4

1 Timothy 4:1

ULT

¹ Now the Spirit says specifically that in later times some will leave the faith, attending to deceiving spirits and teachings of demons,

UST

¹ Now God's Spirit tells us clearly that in these later times some people will stop believing the true message about Jesus. Instead, they will listen to evil spirits who deceive people, and to the false things that these evil spirits teach.

According to the Spirit, what will some people do in the later times?

Some people will leave the faith and attend to deceiving spirits and the teachings of demons.

1 Timothy 4:2

ULT

² through the hypocrisy of liars, {their} own consciences having been seared,

UST

² The evil spirits teach these things through people who lie and only pretend to do what is right. These people do not even feel guilty when they teach false things.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 4:3

ULT

³ forbidding to marry, to abstain from foods that God created for receiving with thanksgiving by the faithful and the ones knowing the truth.

UST

³ They prevent people from marrying. They tell them that they must not eat certain kinds of food. But God created that food as something for us to receive from him and to thank him for. He created it for us who believe in him and who know what is true.

What lies will these people teach?

They will forbid marriage and forbid eating some foods.

1 Timothy 4:4

ULT

⁴ For every creation of God {is} good, and nothing being received with thanksgiving {is} vile,

UST

⁴ Everything that God has made is good. Any kind of food is acceptable to eat if we thank God for it when we eat it.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 4:5

ULT

⁵ for it is sanctified by the word of God and prayer.

UST

⁵ When we pray to God and believe what he said, {that everything he created was good,} then the food that we eat is acceptable to him.

How is anything we eat sanctified for our use?

Anything we eat is sanctified by the word of God and prayer.

1 Timothy 4:6

ULT

⁶ Placing these things before the brothers, you will be a good servant of Christ Jesus, being nourished by the words of the faith and of the good teaching that you have followed.

UST

⁶ If you keep teaching these things to your fellow believers, you will be serving Jesus the Messiah well. You will become strong spiritually as you obey the true message that we all believe. That true message is the good teaching that you have been following.

1 Timothy 4:7

ULT

⁷ But reject the profane and old-womanish myths. Instead, train yourself for godliness,

UST

⁷ But have nothing to do with the worthless, foolish stories. Instead, train yourself to do the things that please God.

In what does Paul tell Timothy to train himself?

Paul tells Timothy to train himself in godliness.

1 Timothy 4:8

ULT

⁸ for "bodily training is valuable for a little, but godliness is valuable for all things, having promise for this present life and the coming one."

UST

⁸ Remember that "training your body helps you a little bit, but learning to do the things that please God helps you in every way. {It is good for you} both as you live now on earth and as you live in the future with God."

Why is training in godliness more profitable than bodily training?

Training in godliness is more profitable because it holds promise for this present life and the coming one.

1 Timothy 4:9

ULT

⁹ That word {is} trustworthy and worthy of all acceptance,

UST

⁹ Everyone should trust this statement and accept it completely.

1 Timothy 4:10

ULT

¹⁰ for unto this we toil and struggle, because we have hoped in the living God, who is the Savior of all men, especially of believers.

UST

¹⁰ For this reason we work as hard as we can, because we confidently expect that the living God will do the things that he has promised. He is the Savior of all humanity, but particularly the Savior of those who believe.

(There are no questions for this verse.)

1 Timothy 4:11

ULT

¹¹ Command and teach these things.

UST

¹¹ Teach the believers about these things and insist that they do them.

What does Paul exhort Timothy to do with all of the good things that he has received in Paul's teaching to him?

Paul exhorts Timothy to command and teach these things.

1 Timothy 4:12

ULT

¹² Let no one despise your youth, but be an example for the believers in word, in conduct, in love, in faith, in purity.

UST

¹² Do not allow anyone to say that you do not matter because you are young. Instead, show other believers how to live. Show them this by how you speak, how you behave, how you love others, how you trust God, and how you keep yourself sexually pure.

In what ways is Timothy to be an example to others?

Timothy is to be an example in word, conduct, love, faith, and purity.

1 Timothy 4:13

ULT

¹³ Until I come, attend to the reading, to the exhortation, to the teaching.

UST

¹³ Until I come back to you, be sure to continue reading {the Scriptures to the believers when you meet together}, teaching {the Scriptures to the believers}, and urging {them to obey the Scriptures}.

UST

UST

¹² {When they do this,} they will become guilty of violating the vow that they made at first {to remain as widows}.

ULT

¹³ But at the same time, they also learn to be lazy, wandering about the houses, and not only lazy, but also babblers and busybodies, saying what they should not.

UST

UST

⁷ For we brought nothing into the world, so that neither are we able to take anything out.

UST

⁷ This is true because we brought nothing into the world {when we were born}, and we are not able to take anything out of it {when we die}.
