2 Kings 1:2

ULT	UST
<i>And Ahaziah fell through the lattice in his upper chamber that {was} in Samaria, and he injured {himself}. And he sent messengers, and he said to them, "Go, inquire of Baal Zebub, the god of Ekron, if I will live from this injury."</i>	<i>One day, Ahaziah, the new king of Israel, was in his room on an upper floor of his palace in Samaria. The window of that room had wooden slats, and he fell through them {down to the floor below} and hurt himself badly. So he sent for some messengers and commanded them, "Go and ask Baal Zebub, the god of Ekron, whether or not I will recover from this injury."</i>

How was Ahaziah injured?

Ahaziah fell down through the lattice in his upper chamber in Samaria, and was injured.

2 Kings 1:4

ULT	UST
<i>And therefore, thus says Yahweh, "The bed where you have gone up there, you will not come down from it, for dying, you will die."'" So Elijah went.</i>	<i>Yahweh says that you should tell King Ahaziah that because he consulted Baal Zebub instead, he will never {recover from this injury. He will never} get out of bed again. Instead, he is certainly going to die." So Elijah went to meet the messengers.</i>

Why was Ahaziah going to certainly die?

Because Ahaziah consulted with Baal Zebub, the god of Ekron, he would certainly die.

2 Kings 1:8

<i>And they said to him, "A man, a master of hair, and a belt of skin was tied around his waist." And he said, "He {was} Elijah the Tishbite."</i>	<i>They replied, "He was wearing a hairy cloak, and he had a wide leather belt around his waist." The king said, "Then that was Elijah the Tishbite!"</i>

What did Elijah wear?

Elijah wore a garment made of hair, and he had a leather belt wrapped around his waist.

2 Kings 1:10

ULT	UST
<i>And Elijah answered and said to the captain of the fifty, "And if I {am} a man of God, let fire come down from the heavens, and let it consume you and your fifty." And fire came down from the heavens, and it consumed him and his fifty.</i>	<i>Elijah replied to the officer, "I am a prophet, as you say. So I command fire to come down from the sky and burn you up along with your fifty soldiers!" Immediately fire came down from the sky and burned up the officer and his fifty soldiers.</i>

What consumed the captain and his fifty men?

A fire came down from heaven, called by Elijah, and it consumed the captain and his fifty men.

2 Kings 1:13

<i>And he returned and sent a third captain of fifty and his fifty. And the third captain of fifty went up and came and knelt on his knees in front of Elijah, and he pleaded with him and said to him, "Man of God, please let my life and the life of these your fifty servants be valuable in your eyes."</i>	<i>{When the king found out about that,} he sent yet another officer with fifty more soldiers. {They went to where Elijah was, and} the officer went up to the top of the hill {alone}. He bowed down {respectfully} in front of Elijah. Then he begged him to be merciful. He said, "You prophet, please do not kill me and my fifty soldiers!"</i>

How did the third captain approach Elijah?

The third captain went up, fell on his knees before Elijah, and begged him to value his life and the lives of his men.

Ahaziah had no son to succeed him as king. So Jehoram{, another son of Ahab,} became the next king. This happened when Jehoram son of Jehoshaphat had been ruling Judah for almost two years.</i>

Why did Joram begin to reign in the place of Ahaziah?

Joram began to reign in his place because Ahaziah had no son.

<i>And it happened, when Yahweh took up Elijah in a whirlwind {to} the heavens, that Elijah went with Elisha from Gilgal.</i>	<i>When Yahweh was about to take the prophet Elijah up to heaven in a whirlwind, Elijah and his fellow prophet Elisha left the city of Gilgal {in the territory of Ephraim, where Elijah had been staying with a community of prophets}.</i>

When did Elijah leave with Elisha from Gilgal?

When Yahweh was going to take up Elijah by a whirlwind into heaven, Elijah left with Elisha from Gilgal.

2 Kings 2:3

ULT	UST
<i>And sons of the prophets who {were in} Bethel came out to Elisha, and they said to him, "Do you know that today Yahweh is taking your master from over your head?" And he said, "I, I also know. Be quiet."</i>	<i>A group of prophets lived in the city of Bethel. Some of them came out and asked Elisha, "Do you know that Yahweh is going to take your master Elijah away from you today?" Elisha told them, "Yes, I know that. Please do not say anything further about it."</i>

How did Elisha answer when the sons of the prophets told him that Yahweh would take his master from him?

Elisha answered, "Yes, I know it, but do not talk about it."

2 Kings 2:8

<i>And Elijah took his cloak and rolled {it} up, and he struck the waters, and they were divided, here and here. And the two of them crossed over on dry ground.</i>	<i>Then Elijah took off his cloak and rolled it up. He hit the water with it, and path opened up for them through the Jordan River. The ground on this pathway became dry, and that allowed them to walk across to the other side.</i>

Why did the river divide on both sides?

Because Elijah took his cloak, rolled it up, and struck the water with it, the river divided on both sides.

2 Kings 2:9

<i>And it happened, when they had crossed over, that Elijah said to Elisha, "Ask what I shall do for you before I am taken from with you." And Elisha said, "Then may a double portion of your spirit please be to me."</i>	<i>When they got to the other side, Elijah told Elisha, "Tell me what you would like me to do for you before Yahweh takes me away." Elisha replied, "{Since I am going to be your successor,} I want you to leave me twice as much of your spirit as you leave to any other prophet{, as if I were your firstborn son}."</i>

For what did Elisha ask?

Elisha asked for a double portion of Elijah's spirit to come on him.

2 Kings 2:11

<i>And it happened, they were going, going and speaking, and behold, a chariot of fire and horses of fire, and they separated between the two of them. And Elijah went up in a whirlwind {to} the heavens.</i>	<i>They continued to walk {away from the Jordan River}. They were talking together as they walked. Suddenly a fiery chariot that fiery horses were pulling appeared. Its driver drove the chariot between Elijah and Elisha to separate them. Then a whirlwind came and lifted Elijah up into the sky.</i>

How did Elijah go up into heaven?

Elijah went up by a whirlwind into heaven.

2 Kings 2:14

<i>And he took the cloak of Elijah that had fallen from on him, and he struck the waters and said, "Where {is} Yahweh, the God of Elijah, even he?" And he struck the waters, and they were divided, here and here, and Elisha crossed over.</i>	<i>He rolled up the cloak and struck the water with it. As he did that, he cried out, "If Yahweh, the God of Elijah, is present, may he do for me what he did for Elijah!" A path opened up for him through the water, and Elisha went across.</i>

What happened when Elisha struck the waters with Elijah's cloak?

When Elisha had struck the waters, they divided on both sides and Elisha crossed over.

They wanted fifty strong men to go and look for Elisha's master, in case the Spirit of Yahweh had taken him up and thrown him onto some mountain or into some valley.

And they sent fifty men, and they searched three days, but they did not find him.</i>	<i>But they kept asking, and finally he felt embarrassed {because it appeared that he did not care about Elijah}. So he said, "Very well, send them." So they had fifty men search for three days, but they did not find Elijah.</i>

For how long did the fifty men search for Elijah?

The fifty men searched for three days.

But the waters {are} bad, so the land is miscarrying."</i>	<i>Then the leaders of Jericho came to talk with Elisha. One of them told him, "Sir, you can see that this is a very nice place to live in. But the water is harmful to drink. It is causing the women and female animals that live here to have miscarriages."</i>

What was the problem at Jericho?

The water was bad and the land was not fruitful.

2 Kings 2:21-22

How was the water healed?

Elisha went out to the spring of water and threw salt in it.

2 Kings 2:23-24

When some boys mocked Elisha, what curse happened to them?

When some boys mocked Elisha, two female bears came out of the woods and mauled forty-two of the boys.

2 Kings 3:2

ULT	UST
<i>And he did evil in the eyes of Yahweh, however, not like his father or like his mother. For he removed the pillar of Baal that his father had made.</i>	<i>He did things that Yahweh had told the Israelites were evil. But he did not do as many evil things as his father Ahab and his mother Jezebel had done. He destroyed the stone pillar for worshiping Baal that his father had set up.</i>

How was Joram's evil different from the evil of his father and his mother?

Joram's evil was not like his father and his mother, for he removed the sacred stone pillar of Baal that his father had made.

2 Kings 3:6

<i>And King Jehoram went out from Samaria on that day, and he mustered all of Israel.</i>	<i>When Mesha rebelled, King Jehoram left the city of Samaria and gathered soldiers from throughout Israel {to reconquer the Moabites}.</i>

Why did King Joram leave Samaria?

King Joram left Samaria to mobilize all Israel for war.

By that time, there was no water left for the soldiers or for the animals they had with them.</i>

What three armies marched around the Sea of the Arabah for seven days?

The armies of Israel, Judah, and Edom marched for seven days.

What had Elisha done for Elijah?

Elisha had poured water on the hands of Elijah, acting as his servant.

I swear by Yahweh that I am only helping you at all because you have Jehoshaphat king of Judah with you, and I respect him.</i>

Why did Elisha pay attention to the king of Israel?

Elisha paid attention to the king of Israel because Elisha honored the presence of Jehoshaphat king of Judah.

2 Kings 3:15

<i>But now, bring to me a harpist.” And it happened when the harpist harped that the hand of Yahweh was upon him.</i>	<i>So bring someone to me who plays the harp.” {So they did that, and} when the person played the harp, Yahweh gave Elisha the power to prophesy.</i>

When did the hand of Yahweh come upon Elisha?

When the harpist played, the hand of Yahweh came upon Elisha.

2 Kings 3:20

ULT	UST
<i>And it happened in the morning when the grain offering went up that behold, waters were coming from the way of Edom, and the land was filled with the waters.</i>	<i>Early the next morning, it was the time when the Israelites customarily offered a grain sacrifice. They suddenly saw water flowing toward them from the direction of Edom. It filled all the ditches they had dug.</i>

When was the country filled with water?

In the morning about the time of offering the grain sacrifice, there came water from the direction of Edom, and the country was filled with water.

2 Kings 3:21

ULT	UST
<i>And all of Moab heard that the kings had come up to fight with them. And they were summoned, from every one tying a belt and upwards, and they stood at the border.</i>	<i>The people of Moab learned that the three kings had come with their armies to fight against them. So they summoned all of their soldiers, including youths who were just learning to fight. The Moabite soldiers set up a defensive position at the border of their land with Edom.</i>

Who from the Moabites gathered themselves together to fight?

All who were able to put on armor gathered themselves together.

What did the Moabites think when they saw the water?

When the Moabites saw the water, they thought the three kings had killed each other.

She told him, "My husband, who was one of the prophets you were training, has died. You know very well that he revered Yahweh greatly. But now someone who lent him money has come and is demanding repayment. {I can not pay him back, so} he is threatening to take away two of my children as slaves {as his payment}!"</i>

What was going to happen to the children of the wife of one of the sons of the prophets?

The creditor was going to take her two children to be his slaves.

2 Kings 4:3

<i>And he said, "Go, ask for yourself vessels from outside, from all of your neighbors, empty vessels. Do not get few."</i>	<i>Elisha said, "Go out to your neighbors and borrow from them as many empty containers as you can."</i>

From where should the woman borrow jars?

The woman should borrow jars from her neighbors.

2 Kings 4:6

<i>And it happened as she was filling the vessels that she said to her son, "Bring to me another vessel." And he said to her, "There is not another vessel." And the oil stopped.</i>	<i>When she had filled a certain container{, her children did not bring her another one}. So she called to one of her sons, "Bring me another container!" But he answered, "There are no more containers!" Right then the olive oil stopped flowing.</i>

When did the oil stop flowing?

After her son said there were no more jars, the oil stopped flowing.

2 Kings 4:10

<i>Please, let us make a small upper room of a wall, and let us put for him there a bed and a table and a chair and a lampstand. And it will be, when he comes to us, he may turn aside to there."</i>	<i>Let us please build a small room for him on our flat roof. Let us put a bed, a table, a chair, and a lampstand in it. If we do that, whenever he comes here, he will have a place to stay."</i>

What did the important woman from Shunem and her husband make for Elisha?

They made a little room on the roof for Elisha, with a bed, a table, a seat, and a lamp.

2 Kings 4:16

<i>And he said, "In this season, according to the time of reviving, you will embrace a son." And she said, "No, my lord, man of God, do not lie to your maidservant."</i>	<i>Elisha told her, "By this time next year you will be holding your infant son in your arms." But she protested, "Sir, please do not deceive me by saying things like that. After all, you are a prophet!"</i>

What was the woman to be holding in one year's time?

In one year's time, she would be holding a son.

2 Kings 4:18-19

When did the child develop pain in his head?

When the child went out one day to his father, who was with harvesters, he cried out about pain in his head.

2 Kings 4:20

ULT	UST
<i>And he picked him up and brought him to his mother. And he sat on her knees until noon, then he died.</i>	<i>So the servant carried him home, and his mother held him on her lap all that morning. But then the boy died.</i>

Where did the child sit until he died?

The child sat on his mother's knees until he died.

<i>And she went, and she came to the man of God at Mount Carmel. And it happened, when the man of God saw her from opposite, that he said to Gehazi his servant, "Behold, that Shunammiteess.</i>	<i>So they traveled as quickly as they could to Mount Carmel, where Elisha was. When Elisha saw her in the distance, he told Gehazi, "Look, here comes that Shunammite woman!"</i>

Where was the man of God?

The man of God was at Mount Carmel.

And she said, "Peace."</i>	<i>Run to her and ask her if everything is all right with her and her husband and with her child!" {So Gehazi ran to her and asked her,} but she told him that she did not want to stop to answer his questions.</i>

When Gehazi asked the woman if everything was alright, what did she answer?

When Gehazi asked the woman if everything was alright, she answered, "It is alright."

Gehazi came over to push her away, but Elisha told him, "Let her stay here! She is feeling great distress about something, but Yahweh has not told me at all what it is."</i>

What did the woman do when she came to the man of God at the mountain?

When she came to the man of God at the mountain, she caught hold of his feet.

2 Kings 4:29

<i>And he said to Gehazi, "Gird your loins, and take my staff in your hand, and go. If you find a man, you shall not bless him, and if a man blesses you, you shall not answer him. And you shall put my staff on the face of the young man."</i>	<i>Then Elisha {realized that something must have happened to her son, so he} told Gehazi, "Tuck your cloak into your belt {so that you can run fast}. Take my staff with you and go to her home. Do not stop to talk to anyone on the way. {Go quickly to where her son is and} lay the staff on the child's face {so that Yahweh may cause him to become alive again}."</i>

What should Gehazi do if he met any man or if anyone greeted him?

If Gehazi met any man or if anyone greeted him, he should not answer him.

2 Kings 4:31

<i>And Gehazi went on to their faces, and he put the staff on the face of the young man, but there was no voice, and there was no hearing. And he returned to meet him, and he declared to him, saying, "The young man did not awaken."</i>	<i>Gehazi hurried quickly to the woman's house ahead of them. When he arrived there, he laid the staff on the boy's face. But he did not say anything, and he did not react when Gehazi spoke to him. So Gehazi went back and met Elisha, who was on his way to Shunem. He told him, "The boy did not become alive again."</i>

What did Gehazi lay on the child's face?

He laid the staff on the child's face.

2 Kings 4:34

<i>And he went up, and he lay on the child, and he put his mouth on his mouth, and his eyes on his eyes, and his palms on his palms. And he stretched out upon him, and the flesh of the child became warm.</i>	<i>Then he climbed onto the bed and lay down on top of the boy's body. He put his mouth on the boy's mouth. Then he put his eyes on the boy's eyes. Then he put his hands on the boy's hands. He stretched his body out over the boy's body. After that, the boy's body started to become warm.</i>

How did the boy's body grow warm?

Elisha stretched himself out on the boy, and the boy's body grew warm.

2 Kings 4:35

<i>And he returned, and he walked in the house, once here and once here. And he went up, and he stretched out upon him. And the young man sneezed until seven times, and the young man opened his eyes.</i>	<i>Elisha went back down to the house and walked around for a while. Then he went back up to the room. What did the child do before he opened his eyes?

The child sneezed seven times and then opened his eyes.

Elisha threw some flour into the pot.

2 Kings 5:1

ULT	UST
<i>Now Naaman, the commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man to the face of his master, and he was lifted up, because through him Yahweh gave deliverance to Aram. And the man was mighty of valor, a leper.</i>	<i>A certain man whose name was Naaman was the commander of the Aramean army. Yahweh had enabled him to win many victories for Aram, and so the king of Aram admired and honored him. Naaman was a great warrior. Unfortunately, he also had leprosy.</i>

What had Yahweh given to Aram by Naaman?

Yahweh had given deliverance to Aram.

2 Kings 5:3

ULT	UST
<i>And she said to her mistress, "Oh that my lord {was} to the face of the prophet who {is} in Samaria! Then he would remove him from his leprosy."</i>	<i>One day that girl told her, "I wish that my master Naaman could go to the prophet who lives in the city of Samaria. That prophet would heal him of his leprosy."</i>

Whom did the little girl say would heal her master?

The girl said the prophet who was in Samaria would heal her master.

2 Kings 5:6

<i>And he brought the letter to the king of Israel, saying, "And now, when this letter comes to you, behold, I have sent to you Naaman my servant, and you shall remove him from his leprosy."</i>	<i>When Naaman arrived, he gave the king of Israel the letter. The king of Aram had written in it, "I am writing this letter to introduce my army commander Naaman. I want you to heal him of his leprosy."</i>

To whom did Naaman take the letter which was from the king of Aram?

Naaman took the letter to the king of Israel.

2 Kings 5:7

<i>And it happened when the king of Israel read the letter that he tore his clothes, and he said, “{Am} I God, killing and making alive, that this {one} is sending to me to remove a man from his leprosy? For surely, please know and see that he is seeking a quarrel with me.”</i>	<i>When the king read the letter, he tore his clothes {to show his distress}. He told his officials, “I am not God! I am not able to cause people to live or to die! So this man should not be asking me to cure someone of leprosy. If you think about it, the king of Aram must want a reason to attack us {and he will pretend to be offended if I do not do what he asks}.”</i>

What did the king of Israel think was the reason Naaman came to him for a cure?

The king of Israel thought Naaman was seeking to start an argument with him.

<i>And Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, “Go, and you shall wash seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will return to you, and be clean.”</i>	<i>But {rather than coming out to speak to Naaman,} Elisha sent a messenger to tell him, “Go to the Jordan River. Go down into its water seven times to wash yourself. Then your skin will become healthy again. You will no longer have leprosy.”</i>

What was Naaman told to do to be clean?

Naaman was told to go and wash himself into the Jordan seven times to be clean.

2 Kings 5:11

<i>And Naaman became angry, and he went, and he said, "Behold, I said to myself, 'Coming out, he will come out, and he will stand, and he will call on the name of Yahweh his God, and he will wave his hand over the place, and he will remove the leprosy.'</i>	<i>But this made Naaman furious, and he left Elisha's house. He {stopped and} told his servants, "I expected him to come out of his house and stand in front of me. I was sure that he would ask Yahweh his God to heal me. I expected him to wave his hand over the area where I have leprosy and heal me!</i>

How did Naaman think Elisha would heal him?

Naaman thought Elisha would come out to him and stand and call on the name of Yahweh his God, and wave his hand over the place and heal the leprosy.

2 Kings 5:14

<i>So he went down, and he dipped in the Jordan seven times, according to the word of the man of God. And his flesh returned like the flesh of a little boy, and he became clean.</i>	<i>So Naaman went to the Jordan River and went down into its water seven times, as the prophet had instructed him to do. Then his skin became smooth once again, like the skin of a young child. He no longer had leprosy.</i>

Like what was Naaman's flesh restored?

Naaman's flesh was restored again like the flesh of a little boy.

2 Kings 5:15

<i>And he returned to the man of God, he and all of his camp, and he came and stood to his face. And he said, "Behold, please, I know that there is no God in all of the earth except in Israel. Ahaz wanted to replicate the altar at Damascus.

Why did Hezekiah think that the word of Yahweh was good?

Hezekiah thought that the word of Yahweh was good because there would be peace and stability in his days.

Whom did Manasseh act more wickedly than?

Where were the horses that the kings of Judah had given to the sun?

The horses that the kings of Judah had given to the sun were in an area at the entrance to the temple of Yahweh, near the room of Nathan Melech.

Who built the Mount of Destruction?

Solomon king of Israel built the Mount of Destruction.

He appointed Gedaliah to be their governor. Gedaliah was the son of Ahikam and the grandson of Shaphan.</i>

Whom did Nebuchadnezzar put in charge of the people who remained in the land of Judah?

Nebuchadnezzar put Gedaliah in charge of them.

All the people and the commanders of the soldiers went to Egypt, because they were afraid of the Babylonians.

When was Jehoiachin released from prison?

Jehoiachin was released from prison in the thirty-seventh year of the exile of Jehoiachin, in the year that Evil Merodach began to reign.

What food did Jehoiachin eat?

Jehoiachin ate regularly at the king's table for the rest of his life. And a regular food allowance was given to him every day for the rest of his life.
