Job 1:1

<i>There was a man in the land of Uz. Job was his name, and that man was blameless and righteous, both fearful of God and turning from evil.</i>	<i>In the land of Uz there lived a man whose name was Job. He was a man of complete integrity. He respected God and so he avoided doing evil things.</i>

How is Job's character described?

He was blameless and righteous and honored God and turned from evil.

Job 1:5

<i>And it happened that when the days of the feast had gone around, Job sent and consecrated them. He arose early in the morning and offered burnt offerings {according to} the number of all of them. For Job said, "Perhaps my sons have sinned and blessed God in their hearts." Thus Job did all the days.</i>	<i>After all of the sons had each held a feast, Job would gather his children together. He would ask Yahweh to cleanse them from any action they might have committed during their feasting that would have made them unacceptable to him. He would get up early in the morning, kill animals, and burn them on the altar {as sacrifices}, one for each {of his children}. {For} Job {always said}, "Perhaps my children have sinned by saying something evil about God in their thoughts. {If they have, I need to ask God to forgive them.}" Job did this after each time his sons had all hosted feasts.</i>

After Job's sons held feasts with their brothers and sisters in their houses, what would Job do?

Job would consecrate them to God, offer burnt offerings, and pray for them.

<i>And Yahweh said to the adversary, "Have you set your heart upon my servant Job? For {there is} not like him on the earth, a blameless and righteous man, fearful of God and turning from evil."</i>	<i>Yahweh said to Satan, "Have you noticed Job, who worships me? I mention him because no one else on earth has such complete integrity as he does. He respects me and so he refuses to do anything evil."</i>

Why did Yahweh say Satan should consider Job?

There was no one like Job on the earth, a blameless and upright man, one who feared God and turned away from evil.

Job 1:10

ULT	UST
<i>Have you not put a hedge around him and around his house and around all that {is} his, from every side? You have blessed the works of his hands, and his cattle have burst forth in the land.</i>	<i>You have always protected him, his family, and everything he owns. You make him succeed in whatever work he does. As a result, he has built very large herds of livestock.</i>

How did Satan say Yahweh had protected Job?

He made a hedge around Job, around his house, and around all that he had on every side.

Job 1:11

ULT	UST
<i>However, just stretch out your hand and touch all that {is} his, if he will not bless you to your face."</i>	<i>But if you attack what he owns and take it away, he will certainly curse you in front of everyone."</i>

What did Satan think would cause Job to renounce God?

He said to Job would renounce God if God attacked all Job's possessions.

Job 1:12

ULT	UST
<i>And Yahweh said to the adversary, "Behold, all that {is} his {is} in your hand. Only against him do not stretch out your hand." And the adversary went away from the face of Yahweh.</i>	<i>Yahweh replied to Satan, "All right, I permit you to take away everything that he has. But do not harm him in his own body." Satan {agreed and then} left Yahweh {in order to carry out his attack on Job}.</i>

What did Yahweh give Satan permission to do?

He gave Satan permission to take everything from Job, but not to lay a hand on his person.

What did the messenger tell Job the Sabeans had done to him?

They killed all Job's servants in the field and took away all the oxen and donkeys.

ULT	UST
<i>That one {was} still speaking and another came and said, "The fire of God fell from the heavens and burned up the sheep and the servants and consumed them, and only I alone have escaped to tell you."</i>	<i>While he was still talking to Job, another messenger arrived. He said to Job, "Lightning from the sky struck and killed all the sheep and all the men who were taking care of them! I am the only one who has escaped to come and tell you what happened."</i>

What did the second messenger tell Job had happened to his sheep?

The fire of God fell from the heavens and burned them up along with the servants.

Job 1:17

ULT	UST
<i>That one {was} still speaking and another came and said, "The Chaldeans formed three groups and rushed against the camels and took them, and they struck the servants with the edge of the sword, and only I alone have escaped to tell you."</i>	<i>While he was still talking to Job, a third messenger arrived. He said to Job, "Three groups of robbers from the region of Chaldea came and attacked us. They stole all the camels and killed all the men who were taking care of them. I am the only one who has escaped to come and tell you what happened."</i>

What did the third messenger tell Job had happened to his camels?

Three groups of robbers came and attacked them. They stole all the camels and killed all the men that were caring for them.

Job 1:18-19

What news did the fourth messenger bring to Job?

Job's sons and daughters were feasting in their brother's home when a great wind came and struck the house, which collapsed on them and killed them.

Job 1:20

ULT	UST
<i>And Job arose and tore his robe and shaved his head and fell to the ground and prostrated himself.</i>	<i>Then Job stood up and tore his robe and shaved his head {because he was very sad}. Then he lay down on the ground to worship God.</i>

What did Job do after he got all these messages?

Job tore his robe, shaved his head, lay facedown on the ground, and worshiped God.

Job 1:21

ULT	UST
<i>And he said, "Naked I came from the womb of my mother, and naked I will return there. Yahweh gave, and Yahweh has taken. May the name of Yahweh be blessed."</i>	<i>He said, "When I was born, I was wearing no clothes. When I die, I will not take any clothes with me. It is Yahweh who gave me everything that I possessed, and it is Yahweh who has taken it all away. I find no fault with Yahweh."</i>

What did Job say about his condition after these events?

He said he came naked from his mother's womb, and he would return naked.

What did Job say that Yahweh had done to him?

Yahweh gave, and Yahweh has taken away.

<i>In all of this, Job did not sin and he did not ascribe impropriety to God.</i>	<i>So in spite of all the things that had happened to him, Job did not sin by saying that what God had done was wrong.</i>

How did Job show that he was not a foolish man?

Job did not sin, nor did he foolishly accuse God.

Job 2:1

ULT	UST
<i>And it was the day, and the sons of God came to present themselves to Yahweh, and the adversary also came in their midst to present himself to Yahweh.</i>	<i>On another day, the angels came again and gathered together in front of Yahweh. Satan also came again.</i>

Who came with the sons of God when they presented themselves before Yahweh?

Satan also came and presented himself.

Job 2:2

ULT	UST
<i>And Yahweh said to the adversary, "From where have you come?" And the adversary answered Yahweh and said, "From wandering on the earth and from going back and forth on it."</i>	<i>Yahweh asked Satan, "Where have you come from {this time}?" Satan replied, "I have come from the earth, where I was traveling around {to see what was happening}."</i>

What did Satan tell Yahweh that he had been doing?

He said he was going to and fro on the earth, and walking back and forth on it.

Job 2:3

<i>And Yahweh said to the adversary, "Have you set your heart on my servant Job? For there is not like him on the earth, a blameless and righteous man, fearful of God and turning from evil. And still he is holding firmly to his integrity, although you incited me against him, to devour him for nothing."</i>	<i>Yahweh asked Satan, "Have you noticed that Job continues to worship me? I mention him again because no one else on earth has such complete integrity as he does. He respects me, and so he refuses to do anything evil. He still does this even though you persuaded me to {permit you to} attack him for no reason."</i>

How did Yahweh say that Job continued to do after Satan's attacks?

Job held fast to his integrity.

Job 2:5

<i>However, just stretch out your hand and touch upon his bones and upon his flesh, if he will not bless you to your face."</i>	<i>But if you harm his body, he will certainly curse you in front of everyone!"</i>

What does Satan want to do to Job now so that Job will curse God?

Satan wants to touch Job's bones and his body to hurt him.

Job 2:7

<i>And the adversary went away from the face of Yahweh, and he struck Job with bad boils from the sole of his foot to his pate.</i>	<i>Satan {agreed and he} left. He went and caused Job to suffer from very painful boils all over his body.</i>

How did Satan afflict Job's body?

He afflicted Job with severe boils from the sole of his foot to the top of his head.

He took a potshard and scraped himself as he sat in ashes.

What did Job's wife want him to do?

Job's wife wanted him to curse God and die.

What accusation did Job make to his wife?

He accused her of thinking they should receive good at the hand of God but not evil.

What did Job's three friends do when they heard what happened to Job?

They came to mourn with him and comfort him.

How did the three friends of Job show their grief when they saw him?

They raised their voices and wept, tore their robes, threw dust on their heads, and sat on the ground in silence for seven days and nights.

Job 3:1-3

What did Job say about the day he was born?

He cursed the day he was born and asked that it would perish.

Job 3:5

ULT	UST
<i>May darkness and a dark shadow claim it; may a cloud dwell over it; may the blacknesses of the day terrify it.</i>	<i>I wish that that day were only darkness, with clouds blocking out the sunlight and many other things also making it very dark.</i>

What does Job want to claim the day he was born?

He wants that day to be claimed by darkness and the shadow of death.

Job 3:6

ULT	UST
<i>That night—may gloom take it! May it not rejoice among the days of the year; into the number of the months may it not come.</i>	<i>I wish that the moon and stars would not shine on the night when my mother conceived me. I wish that the day of my birth was not part of any month. Indeed, I wish that it was not a day in the year at all.</i>

What does Job want to seize the night he was conceived?

Job wants that night to be seized by gloom.

Job 3:11

ULT	UST
<i>Why did I not die from the womb, come out of the belly and expire?</i>	<i>I wish that I had died right after my mother gave birth to me! I wish I had stopped breathing after being alive for only a short time!</i>

What did Job wish had happened when he came out of the womb?

He wishes he had died at birth.

Job 3:13-14

What does Job say he would be doing now if he had died at birth?

He would be sleeping and at rest with kings and counselors of the earth.

Job 3:18-19

From what are prisoners and servants released in death?

The prisoner is released from the voice of the slave driver, and the servant is free from his master.

Job 3:21

ULT	UST
<i>the ones longing for death, but {it is} not to them, and they dig for it more than for hidden treasure,</i>	<i>They long to die, but they do not die. They desire to die more than people desire to find buried treasure.</i>

To whom does Job say that death will not come?

It does not come to the one who longs for death and who searches for it more than those who search for hidden treasure.

Job 3:24

ULT	UST
<i>For my sighing comes before my food, my groaning flows out like waters.</i>	<i>I am wishing that I were dead because now I cry so much that I cannot eat. I just keep groaning loudly.</i>

How does Job describe his groaning?

His groaning flows out like water.

Job 3:26

ULT	UST
<i>I have not relaxed, and I have not reposed, and I have not rested, but trouble comes."</i>	<i>I really have no peace of mind at all. My troubles keep disturbing me."</i>

What are the things that troubles have replaced in Job's life?

He cannot be at ease or quiet and has no rest.

Job 4

Job 4:3

ULT	UST
<i>Behold, you have instructed many, you have strengthened weak hands.</i>	<i>You yourself have given good advice to many people. You have encouraged people who were discouraged.</i>

What good things does Eliphaz say Job has done for others?

Job had instructed many and strengthened weak hands.

Job 4:6

ULT	UST
<i>{Is} not your fear your confidence, your hope, even the integrity of your ways?</i>	<i>You should be confident because you honor God. You should be hopeful because you conduct yourself with integrity.</i>

What does Eliphaz say is Job's confidence and hope in time of trouble?

Job's fear of God is his confidence, and the integrity of his ways is his hope.

Job 4:8-9

Who perishes by the breath of God and his anger?

Those who plow misery and sow trouble perish and cease to exist.

Job 4:10

ULT	UST
<i>The roar of the lion! The voice of the fierce lion! But the teeth of the young lions are broken.</i>	<i>Wicked people may boast and threaten, but God destroys them.</i>

What does Eliphaz say is broken?

The teeth of young lions are broken.

Job 4:12-13

How did Eliphaz secretly receive a certain message?

He heard a whisper in his ear and saw visions in the night.

Job 4:14

ULT	UST
<i>fear happened to me, and trembling, and it frightened all my bones.</i>	<i>I was so scared that I started to shake all over.</i>

What came upon Eliphaz when he received the message?

Fear and trembling came on him.

Job 4:17

ULT	UST
<i>‘Will a man be more righteous than God? If a man will be more pure than his Maker?’</i>	<i>‘No human being can be more righteous than God. No person can be better than his Creator.’</i>

What did the voice ask about mortal men?

It asked if a mortal man can be more righteous than God, more pure than his Maker.

Job 4:19

ULT	UST
<i>How much less dwellers in houses of clay that {have} their foundation in the dust! They crumble them before a moth!</i>	<i>So God is even more careful to discipline human beings, knowing how very frail they are.</i>

How does Eliphaz describe mortal men?

They live in houses of clay with their foundation in the dust, and they are crushed sooner than a moth.

Job 5

Job 5:2

ULT	UST
<i>For indignation kills the foolish, and resentment kills the one being simple.</i>	<i>People who do not respect God get angry with God {instead of considering how they have sinned}. Naïve people resent God {when they do not get what they think they deserve}. {Their anger and resentment lead them to disobey God, so that} God punishes them severely and even kills them. So respect God and do not be naïve!</i>

What does Eliphaz say will happen to a foolish and simple man?

Indignation kills the foolish man, and resentment kills the simple one.

Job 5:4

ULT	UST
<i>His children are far from safety, and they are crushed at the gate, and {there is} none rescuing {them},</i>	<i>Their children are never safe. They always lose to their opponents in court because no one defends them.</i>

What happens to the children of the foolish person in the city gate?

They are unsafe, they are crushed in the gate and are not rescued.

Job 5:7

ULT	UST
<i>For man is born to trouble, and sons of the flame soar to fly.</i>	<i>No, people cause trouble for themselves throughout their lives. This is as certain as the fact that sparks shoot up from a fire.</i>

From where does trouble really come?

All his life, man makes his own trouble.

Job 5:10

ULT	UST
<i>the one giving rain on the face of the earth and sending waters on the face of the fields,</i>	<i>God is the one who sends rain onto the earth so that it waters our fields.</i>

What does God give to the earth and the fields?

He gives rain on the earth and sends water on the fields.

Job 5:12

ULT	UST
<i>frustrating the plans of the crafty, and their hands do not accomplish an initiative,</i>	<i>God keeps devious people from being able to do what they plan.</i>

What does God do the schemes of crafty people?

He frustrates their schemes so that their hands cannot carry out their plots.

Job 5:15

ULT	UST
<i>But he saves the poor from the sword in their mouths and from the hand of the mighty.</i>	<i>When powerful people threaten or accuse weak people, God rescues the weak people. He keeps the powerful people from harming them.</i>

From what does God save the needy and poor person?

He saves the poor person from the threats and accusations of the mighty and saves the needy person from harm by the mighty people.

Job 5:18

ULT	UST
<i>For he injures and binds up, he wounds and his hands heal.</i>	<i>You should be thankful because God allows people to suffer {in order to correct them} and then he restores them.</i>

Why is the man happy whom God corrects and chastens?

He is happy because the wounds, God binds up wounds, and his hands heal.

Job 5:22

ULT	UST
<i>You will laugh at destruction and at famine, and you will not fear the beast of the earth.</i>	<i>You will not worry about things like that or about not having enough to eat. You will not be afraid that wild animals will hurt you,</i>

At what will the man whom God corrects laugh?

He will laugh at destruction and famine.

Job 5:24

ULT	UST
<i>You will know that your tent {is in} peace; you will visit your sheepfold and you will not miss {anything}.</i>	<i>You will know that things will go well for you in your home. When you check on your animals, you will see that they are all there.</i>

What will the man whom God corrects find when he visits his sheepfold?

He will find that nothing will be missing.

Job 5:26

ULT	UST
<i>You will come to the grave in old age, like the lifting of a stack of grain in its time.</i>	<i>You will live a long life, like grain that grows to become fully ripe before it is harvested.</i>

How long will the man whom God corrects live?

He will come to his grave at a full age.

Job 6

Job 6:2-3

How does Job describe his anguish and his calamity?

If his anguish and calamity were weighed, they would be heavier than the sand of the seas.

Job 6:4

ULT	UST
<i>For the arrows of the Almighty are in me, whose poison my spirit is drinking; the terrors of God array themselves against me.</i>	<i>It is as if Almighty God had shot me with arrows. It is as if those arrows had poison on their tips and that poison had gone into my spirit. The things that God has done to me are like soldiers lined up to attack me.</i>

What has the Almighty done to Job with his arrows?

His arrows are in Job, and Job's spirit drinks up the poison.

Job 6:6

ULT	UST
<i>Will the unsavory be eaten without salt? If there is taste in the white of an egg?</i>	<i>People use salt to help them eat food that has little taste. People do that with the white of an egg, for example. I have been saying how I feel in order to help me deal with my situation.</i>

What food does Job say has no taste?

He says the white of an egg does not have any taste.

Job 6:8-9

What one request does Job long for God to grant him?

He wants God to crush him and cut him loose from his life.

Job 6:10

ULT	UST
<i>Yet may it still be my consolation—indeed, let me exult in pain, may he not spare— that I have not concealed the sayings of the Holy One.</i>	<i>If he did that, I would be comforted: I would know that in spite of the unrelenting pain I had suffered, I would still always have obeyed God's commands.</i>

What is Job's consolation?

His consolation is that he has not have denied the words of the Holy One.

Job 6:13

ULT	UST
<i>If my help {is} not in me, and initiative has been taken away from me?</i>	<i>I am no longer able to help myself. My troubles are keeping me from doing that.</i>

What has been taken away from Job?

Initiative has been taken away from him.

Job 6:14

ULT	UST
<i>To the despairing, covenant faithfulness from his friend, and the fear of the Almighty he forsakes.</i>	<i>When a man has many troubles, his friends should be kind to him, even if he stops honoring Almighty God.</i>

To whom should a friend show faithfulness?

A friend should show faithfulness to the despairing person.

Job 6:15-17

How does Job compare his brothers to a desert streambed?

They have dealt treacherously like a wadi: they disappear in the dry season.

Job 6:18-20

What happened to the caravans when they looked for water in these streams?

They wandered into barren land and then perished. They were disappointed and deceived.

Job 6:21

ULT	UST
<i>For now you are nothing; you see a terror and you fear.</i>	<i>Similarly, you three have not helped me at all! You have seen that terrible things have happened to me, and you are not helping me, because you are afraid that God might do similar things to you.</i>

Why were Job's friends nothing to him?

They saw his dreadful situation and were afraid, so they did not help him.

Job 6:24

ULT	UST
<i>Teach me, and I will be silent, and how I have strayed, make me understand.</i>	<i>Answer me now, and then I will be quiet; tell me what wrong things I have done!</i>

What does Job say he will do if his friends would teach him?

He will be silent.

Job 6:26

ULT	UST
<i>Do you think to correct my words, and to the wind the words of one despairing?</i>	<i>I am a man who has nothing to hope for, but you try to correct me, and you think what I say is as useless as the wind!</i>

What does Job say his friends plan to do with his words?

They plan to correct his words and ignore what he has said.

Job 6:29

ULT	UST
<i>Please turn, let injustice not be; yes, turn, my righteousness {is} yet in it.</i>	<i>Please stop saying that I have sinned! Stop criticizing me unfairly! You should realize that I have not done anything wrong.</i>

Why does Job say his friends should relent in their attacks on him?

Job's cause is just.

Job 7

Job 7:2-3

To what does Job compare his months of misery and trouble-filled nights?

He compares them to a slave desiring relief from heat, or a hired man looking for his wages.

Job 7:5

ULT	UST
<i>My flesh wears the worm and the clod of dust; my skin breaks and festers.</i>	<i>My body is covered with maggots and dirt; pus oozes out of my open sores.</i>

What covers Job's flesh?

Worms and clods of dust, open sores and infection cover his flesh.

Job 7:6

ULT	UST
<i>My days are swifter than a shuttle, and they end without hope.</i>	<i>I am running out of days faster than a shuttle releases yarn into a loom, and I have no reason to hope that my life will end well.</i>

What image does Job use to describe the speed of his days?

His days pass more swiftly than a weaver's shuttle.

Job 7:9

ULT	UST
<i>A cloud disappears and goes away; so the one descending to Sheol does not ascend.</i>	<i>Just as a cloud never appears in the sky again once it fades, so when people die and go to the place where dead people are, they never return to earth.</i>

To what does Job compare the man who goes down to Sheol?

He is like a cloud that is consumed and vanishes away.

Job 7:11

ULT	UST
<i>Therefore I will not restrain my mouth; I will speak in the distress of my spirit; I will complain in the bitterness of my soul.</i>	<i>So I will say everything I want to say. I will speak because I am so upset. I will complain because I am so bitter.</i>

In what way will Job speak and complain?

He will speak in the anguish of his spirit and complain in the bitterness of his soul.

Job 7:14

ULT	UST
<i>then you scare me with dreams and you terrify me through visions,</i>	<i>But then you make me have terrible nightmares!</i>

What does God do to Job when Job goes to bed?

God scares him with dreams and terrifies him through visions.

Job 7:16

ULT	UST
<i>I loathe; I will not live forever. Cease from me, for my days {are} vapor.</i>	<i>I hate being alive {and suffering so much}! I do not want to live any longer! Stop afflicting me, because I will only be alive for a short time.</i>

Why did Job want God to leave him alone?

Job said his days are useless.

Job 7:19

ULT	UST
<i>For how long will you not look away from me? Will you not slacken until I swallow my saliva?</i>	<i>I wish you would stop watching me and leave me alone for at least a little while!</i>

What does Job ask God to let him alone long enough to do?

He asks to be left alone long enough to swallow his own saliva.

Job 7:21

ULT	UST
<i>Why will you not pardon my transgression and take away my iniquity? For now I will lie down in the dust, and you will seek me diligently, but I will not exist."</i>	<i>If I have done wrong things, you could just forgive me. I am going to die soon. When I do, then if you decide you want us to be friends, it will be too late, because I will be dead."</i>

What does Job think God will not do?

Job thinks God will not pardon his transgression and take away his iniquity.

Job 8

Job 8:2

ULT	UST
<i>"Until when will you say these things, and the words of your mouth {be} a mighty wind?"</i>	<i>"Job, you should not continue to talk like this. You are saying a lot of things, but they are not sensible."</i>

To what did Bildad compare the words of Job's mouth?

He compared them to a mighty wind.

Job 8:4

ULT	UST
<i>If your children sinned against him, then he put them in the hand of their sins.</i>	<i>Your children sinned against God. This is evident, because God has punished them for the evil things they did.</i>

How did Bildad say he knew that Job's children sinned?

He said he knew this because God had punished them for their sins.

Job 8:6

ULT	UST
<i>if you {are} pure and upright, surely now he will rouse himself for you and restore the habitation of your righteousness.</i>	<i>If you are genuinely good, then God will certainly do something good for you. He will give you back the abundant prosperity that good people have.</i>

How does Bildad say that God would bless Job if Job were pure and upright?

God would reward Job by restoring his former home and wealth.

Job 8:9

ULT	UST
<i>For we {are} of yesterday and we do not know, for our days on earth {are} a shadow.</i>	<i>I advise you to consider the wisdom of our ancestors because we have only been alive for a short time and we know very little. This is because our time here on the earth is very short, like a shadow that appears briefly and then goes away.</i>

To what does Bildad compare our days on earth?

He says they are a shadow.

Job 8:11

ULT	UST
